
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A Message from the President

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
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

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High Level Dialogue on ASEAN Italy Economic Relations

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This year saw the one hundred and seventeenth edition of the 'classica delle foglie morte', the Giro di Lombardia 2023, that took place on 7 October 2023 over a course of 238 km, starting in Como and finishing in Bergamo, Italy.

The race route covers 238 kilometres and features a number of challenging climbs. There are seven climbs in total, with the crucial moment coming at Passo Di Ganda (9.2 km), whose summit will be reached with 32 kilometres to go.The last obstacle, located three kilometres from the finish in Bergamo, is the Colle Aperto climb (1.3 km).

Twenty-five teams, each consisting of seven riders, will take part in the race. Among them promises to be an exciting showdown with the heavyweights of the discipline: mr. Pogacar, two-time Tour de France record holder, mr. Roglic, Tokyo 2020 Olympic time trial champion and mr. Evenepoel, world time trial champion.

Lombardia marked the end of Thibaut Pinot's great career. The 33-year-old Frenchman won the race in 2018 and scored stage victories in all three Grand Tours. He was up against his compatriot, 2023 Giro d'Italia winner Primoz Roglic, and former Vuelta champion Remco Evenepoel.

In an entertaining race, Slovenian Tadej Pogacar signed an extraordinary hat-trick at II Lombardia, entering the history of road cycling. He attacked with just over 30 kilometres to go on the descent of the Passo di Ganda and, despite a cramp problem, crossed the finish line in Bergamo almost a minute ahead of his rivals. At the finish in Bergamo, only 122 cyclists, of the 175 who started from Como, completed the race.

Italy agrees to promote two-way gastronomy and tourism ties

Rome's Circus Maximus to host Made in Italy farm food festival

The free festival is hosted by the Italian agricultural association Coldiretti which describes the event as "the largest zero-kilometre market ever created in Italy". The farmers' market will include wine and beer tastings and a "school of extra virgin olive oil", according to organisers, as well as areas offering information about pet therapy and farmhouse holidays. There is also an an "agri-kindergarten" where children can learn about skills such as kneading bread and growing vegetables. Organisers say the aim of the festival is to highlight the biodiversity of Italian agriculture and the quality of Made in Italy.

Michelangelo's secret sketches under church in Florence open to public

Michelangelo Buonarroti left behind a trail of artistic marvels, including his statue of David and the sublime frescoes that adorn the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. Now a "secret" room in Florence whose walls are sketched with doodles that the Italian Renaissance master is believed to have created while evading a death sentence ordered by Pope Clement VII amid his falling out with the powerful Medici family is to officially open to the public for the first time.

Can German engineering solve the challenges of fusion? Retrieved from BBC, 13 October 2023

Last month the German government announced an additional €370m (£320m; \$390m) in funding for nuclear fusion research and development. This brings the total budget earmarked for the next five years to €1bn. "We want to create a fusion ecosystem with industry, so that a fusion power plant in Germany becomes reality as quickly as possible," said Minister of Research, Bettina Stark-Watzinger. Nuclear fusion is the reaction that powers the sun. It produces vast amounts of energy by fusing together hydrogen nuclei. If it can be harnessed here on Earth, then it promises abundant, cheap, and emission-free electricity.

Claudia Goldin wins Nobel in economics for work on women's pay

The jury at the Bank of Sweden broke new ground on two counts when, on Monday, October 9, it awarded its 2023 Prize for Economic Science to Claudia Goldin. For the first time, it has chosen a woman as its sole laureate – the previous two, Elinor Ostrom in 2009 and Esther Duflo in 2019, were "co-laureates" alongside male economists (Oliver Williamson for the former, Abhijit Banerjee and Michael Kremer for the latter). And they chose an economist specializing in gender inequality.

These practices have earned the new factory the CarbonNeutral® operations certification.

This accreditation, awarded by CarbonNeutral certifier Climate Impact Partners, recognizes that Vittoria has met the provisions of the CarbonNeutral Protocol - an open source standard and guide developed for business that draws toaccounting into a practical guide to carbon neutrality.

The relationship between Vittoria Group and Thailand is long-lasting. 

100 years of Migration from Valtellina to Australia - From the Mountains to the Deserts

[Part 1]



If you ever find yourself gazing at the mass to higher pastures in the Orobie Valtellina terraces, you're looking at a view that's hardly changed since Bartolomeo Besta, a proud Teglio resident, was awestruck in 1882. The stone walls seem to go on forever, holding up the vineyard tiers, and you can imagine these tiers heavy with vines winding around pergolas. They would have been like a work of art carved into the steep mountainsides, reaching around 800 meters on the Rhaetian Alp side. Above that altitude, grapes struggle, giving way to birch and poplar trees, and even higher up, you'll see rugged terrain and visible erosion. But there, you might spot pine and gin trees and a colorful burst of wildflowers in the spring.

Nowadays, though, vineyards are on the decline. In many places, they're making room for apple or kiwi orchards, and the forest is slowly taking back its territory uear by uear. Vineuards start low on the northern Orobie Alps and then transform into chestnut groves and other kinds of woods. Transhumance, an old tradition, has all but stopped, but it used to see villages moving their animals in

Alps and the Rhaetian Alps during the warmer months. These pastures used to be shared land, but in the mid-19th century, they were sold off, and farmers had to buy them to keep using them.

The story behind the terraces in Valtellina is shrouded in mystery. Most historians think they've been around since Roman times, but they're still unsure. We know vineyards were thriving by the 16th and 17th centuries, suggesting these terraces were essential for village life.

As time passed, especially in the 19th ce ntury, when the population was booming, these terraces rapidly expanded. People used even the most barren and challenging terrain to grow their grapes. The terraces stood behind massive retaining walls made of stacked stones, rising over a meter tall and half a meter thick. But these walls often couldn't handle the weight of all that soil and needed constant fixing. The soil itself was shallow, barely covering the rocky layer underneath. And on those steep slopes, rain, snowmelt, and incessant cultivation constantly caused the soil to move downhill. The peasants "contadini" had to haul it endlessly back to the mountainsides in wicker baskets.

Valtellina might look like a postcard, but it was a region perpetually struggling with rural poverty. Less than 7% of all the land in the province of Sondrio was arable compared with an average of 55% for Lombardy and some provinces as hiah as 85-95%.

What little agriculture was mainly about growing grapes - monoculture was the norm. However, these traditional farming practices had their drawbacks. This dependence on a single crop rendered its economy extremely vulnerable. Although the province produced a wide variety of other produce-cheeses, butter, chestnuts, milk, and silkworm cocoons-it could not feed itself. Crop rotation and experimentation were hampered by the "a livello", a hereditary agricultural contract requiring payment to the church or wealthy landowners in exactly the crop and quantity initially agreed upon, sometimes several centuries ago. Small landowners did most of

tury, following the lead of other European powers, embarked on a series of military misadventures of land grabbing in Africa, collectively described as "The Scramble for Africa 1876-1912" Italy supported its military adventurism by conscripting its young peasant men.

The fact that Valtellina occupies a strategic position as the entry point to the Poschiavo Valley is partially the reason for the shift of Valtellina's emigration towards Australia during this period.

In 1855, when this area was grappling with its most severe hardships, the local populace found themselves susceptible to the efforts and messaging of emigration agents active in the Swiss towns just across the nearby borders. It has been demonstrated that a web of interests existed involving ship owners from Hamburg, Dieppe, and Liverpool who had

the vineyard work, and in 1882, Besta, called them the "poorest and most tired folks in the province" due to the backbreaking, costly, and precarious nature of vine cultivation. The economist Jacini¹, even thought it was crazu to call them landowners and likened them to indentured servants.

Contemporaries also remarked on the fervent desire to possess the impoverished land and the subsequent disintearation, or, as some asserted, almost complete pulverisation of viable farmlands. This was primarily due to inheritance laws that mandated the equitable division of each parcel among heirs. Given the prevalence of large families with eight, ten, or even more children, the number of heirs could be substantial. Nowhere else had fragmentation advanced to an extreme extent as in this reaion.

At the end of the 19th century, work started to reclaim the plains near the Adda River, especially around Tirano. They started building embankments to reclaim the land and cultivate the fertile alluvial soils.

Today, Valtellina has changed and grows many grains, like rue, corn, and dark raceno wheat, commonly known as spelt, used to make local delicacies like pizzoccheri, and the "black" taragna polenta.

Part 1: - The Great Migration - The Early Years

Australia was not a popular destination for emigrating Italians in the early nineteenth century. The tiny trickle to Australia was dwarfed by the massive exodus to the Americas, Africa, and other parts of Europe. However, Price² estimated that, of all male Italian settlers in Australia between 1890 and 1940, those from the northern regions comprised 70 per cent. The Valtellina remained one of the most prolific sources of Italian immigration up to 1940, and after World War II, this migration burgeoned even further.

Italy's first regular consul to Australia,

Giuseppe Biagi, arrived in Melbourne in

1864 and was briefed to keep track of Italian nationals and was charged with taking a census of those in his district. For the 1871 Italian census, Biagi estimated the number of Italian residents in his consular district at 1,300, of which most (about 1,000) were in Victoria and most of the rest in New Zealand. According to Biagi, 80 per cent were from northern Italy, and over half of these, 57 per cent, were from the province of Sondrio, with the rest from Como and Bergamo.

valleys: the smaller Valchiavenna in the west and the larger Valtellina, traversed by the upper Adda River in the east. Both valleys open onto Lake Como. Sondrio, the province's capital, lies approximately 50 km from the lake. Driven by the harsh economic reality, it is unsurprising that people from the province would be among the first transoceanic migrants from Italy. Their destinations were America (both North and South) and Australia. The Valtellinese preferred migrating to Australia, whereas those from Valchiavenna and other parts of Lombardy primarily chose the Americas. In a family memoir, a Valtellina native, Maria Triaca, wrote despairingly about "a steady exodus of people from our re-

The reasons for this wave of mass migration are at least twofold: privation and conscription. As a unified country, Italy was then relatively young, with the Kingdom of Italy being proclaimed in 1861 under the Risorgimento. Until World War 1, Italy remained an overwhelmingly agricultural country, and over three-quarters of the rural population were landless contadini. Nevertheless, Italy harboured imperial aspirations and, at the end of the nineteenth cen-



The province of Sondrio consists of two established connections with railway companies in the Rhine States. German shipping firms, capitalising on repealing the British Navigation Acts of 1849 that had hitherto granted England a trade monopolu with its colonies, had effectively entered competition with Britain for commerce with and transport to its colonial territories. They had also established a network of agencies in central Europe. In Hamburg, shipbuilding companies began constructing sailing vessels tailored to the Australian route, specifically transporting German and Italian emiarants.

> The discovery of gold in Victoria in 1851 proved a boon for these companies. By 1853, they sought new regions to attract emigrants for their ships. These Swiss go-betweens took advantage of the situation, and in early 1854, recruitment agents focused their efforts on emigrants from specific areas of the Ticino region and Lombardy. They carried out extensive propaganda campaigns through advertisements in local newspapers, and in some towns, company representatives were dispatched to establish agent networks. Competitors like James Baines fiercely competed with Oswald's and the Beck-Herzog shipping lines

> By the spring of 1854, the region had succumbed to a gold rush frenzy. Emigrants who engaged with these companies often entered contracts that stipulated the repayment of their fare within two years, using their earnings from abroad. Some even resorted to mortgaging their properties under stringent agreements to secure the necessary funds. Most departing vessels sailed from Hamburg, while a few departed from Mediterranean ports in France, and English ships set sail from Liverpool.

> As early as May 1855, the Prefettura in Sondrio sent a cautionary message to the district commissioners of Tirano concerning the actions of these foreign agents. They also issued additional circulars in both June and August. In November, Sondrio once more alerted the district commissioners of Tirano to the activities of agents who were inciting uoung men in the province, convincing them of the potential for lucrative earnings in Australia. The authorities made efforts to counteract this propaganda, and the police were actively engaged in dispelling these notions.

> Because the authorities had limited power to act against agents operating from Switzerland, they sought to regulate the emigration of their citizens by withholding their travel documents. The Comune

in Tirano received instructions from Sondrio to exercise extreme caution before granting or endorsing requests for passports or other travel papers, particularly for destinations in Switzerland or Piedmont. They were also instructed to revoke such travel documents from individuals who had no genuine reason to travel to a foreign country, especially if there were suspicions that they were going to Australia.



To counter this criticism, the shipping companies took meticulous care in escorting emigrants to their ports of embarkation, where they were frequently asked to confirm the excellent treatment received from the company by signing statements intended for publication in the local press of the migrants. However, a different narrative emerged aboard the ships, as revealed in the emigrants' protest letters from Melbourne or the goldfields. These letters contained numerous severe allegations of mistreatment during the arduous voyage and after the most pressing crises had subbreaches of contractual obligations. They began arriving swiftly, and many found their way into newspaper publications.

Undoubtedly, the origins of the significant Valtellina migrations to Australia can be traced back to the activities of these shipping company agents. Overwhelmingly, departures for Australia in the 1850s and 1860s originated from towns and villages close to the Swiss border. Moreover, these towns registered complaints about individuals avoiding military service.

Evasion of military service had consistently been another compelling incentive for young men considering emigration. The conscription process, often determined by a lottery system, was consistently unpopular, and this sentiment might have been particularly pronounced under Austrian rule, where the enforcement of this obligation was ing emigrants, with their accumulated stricter than in imperial territories locat- savings and news from overseas, also ed north of the Alps.

Serving in the Austrian army typically meant being deployed outside Italy, and there were no patriotic motivations to ease the burden. Even after the Risoraimento, the prospect of an easy escape from conscription and the added allure of potential riches in distant lands continued to exert a strong pull on many young adventurers seeking to evade military service.



that over fifty individuals had been enticed to go to Australia in that year, and many of these were described as "honest, intelligent, and hard-working young men" who were liable for military service. Most eligible individuals in Lombardy who failed to present themselves for military duty belonged to communes in Valtellina. Instead of conscription, they were heading to Switzerland and emigration to Australia, with enticing promises of employment and a bright future.

By the 1870s, well-established routes to Australia from the towns and villages of the Valtellina had been forged. These paths continued to be travelled even sided. Periodic reports of the discovery of new goldfields in Australia would consistently entice gold prospectors, those seeking to evade military conscription and those fleeing reoccurring economic crises at home.

In the 1880s, the vineyards, recovered from the Crittogama epidemic with the widespread adoption of sulphur treatment, were once again devastated by Phylloxera. However, even in the best of times, this monocultural economy had limited job opportunities, and life in Valtellina remained difficult.

Consequently, the people of the Valtellina continued to emigrate, driven by the hope of attaining a better life. Migration networks began to form, facilitated by the arrival of funds for travel tickets sent by fathers, brothers, or cousins, along with letters and remittances. Returnplayed a role in this dynamic. Before the century ended, Australia was no longer seen as a foreign land. It became fa-

miliar in the towns and villages of the Valtellina, and this familiarity significantly influenced the future direction of miarations.

A culture of emigration, mainly to Australia, took root in the Valtellina, ensuring that most of its emigrants would follow the same well-worn paths in the next century.

The end of the century saw a modicum of prosperitu return to Valtellina. and with gold becoming harder to mine in Australia, immigration slowed, and many immigrants returned.

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
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
